Photo courtesy of: As most of the world continues to deal with COVID-19, people in East Africa are facing challenges on several fronts. Kenya, Uganda and Ethiopia are experiencing crushing swarms of locusts, and crops that people need food are being devoured before they can even be harvested. It also seems likely that these swarms will soon migrate to neighboring nations. It's hard to say how much damage these huge insect clouds will cause, but by studying the conditions that allowed the population of the booming locusts, scientists hope to predict the extent of the damage ahead of time and find plans to mitigate it. However, it is difficult to implement a large-scale plan to combat these threatening insects even at the best of times, let alone during a pandemic. The first important question to ask about this infestation is what caused it. Locust swarms has been a recurring problem for farmers in Africa and Europe since recorded history began. In fact, historians in Rome, ancient Greece and elsewhere have commented on the intermittent scourge of locusts over the centuries. Photo courtesy: Laika ac/Flickr The locust most associated with swarms and devastation is the desert locust, gregarious Schistocerca. This particular species is uniquely dangerous due to its size, feeding habits and unpredictability. A single square kilometer swarm is able to consume several hundred pounds of food in a single day. Their favorite target is to grow crops, which is why desert locusts are a significant threat to small rural communities: they can't pick up their food early to keep the locusts from eating it, which means that all the village food can disappear quickly. There is very little regularity to locust swarms, although ecologists have theories as to why there are usually several years between swarms. The most likely answer is the amount of moisture in the desert sandy soil, which is where the locusts lay their eggs. Normally, the soil is too dry for more than a couple of locust eggs to hatch, which means they don't have the numbers to form a swarm. However, the last few years have been exceptionally wet for East Africa. After the area survived several cyclones, floods and wind, the once-dry soil has been constantly humid, which means that more and more locusts have hatched and survived into adulthood. With so many locusts around, swarms are inevitable. A factor contributing to the increase in cyclone size, force and frequency is warming ocean temperatures, particularly in the Indian Ocean, which borders much of East Africa. As temperatures continue to rise around the world, cyclones and that come from wet soil can become a normal outbreak. We hope that lawmakers and humanitarian workers will be able to come together and create an action plan to address this emerging crisis. Unfortunately, the longer it takes to sedate swarms of locust, the more damage they will do, and there is little that can be done to counter the rain that accelerates their growth. The pandemic is also causing more localized problems in solving the locust problem. After all, it is difficult to perform a massive spraying operation without drivers, but when everyone is self-isolating, it can be difficult to find drivers both at home and abroad who are willing or able to do the necessary work. Regional conflicts, such as the civil war in Yemen, also complicate the ability of governments to act. Locusts generally do not move through rainforests or high mountains, and do not go far into Europe. However, they have spread as far as the Caribbean, India and even Russia. While large-scale locusts tend to die in the end, leaving only their original range in East Africa, they can do enormous damage before it happens. This particular swarm has already reached 16 countries, including India, Iran and Jordan. At this point a further spread seems inevitable, and as the summer rainy season approaches, it is possible that these parasites will spread over much of North and West Africa. Based on the destruction already caused by these insatiable insects, it is likely that more than 25 million people in Africa will struggle to find enough food during 2020 if nothing changes. While prevention is the most effective way to control locust swarms, time for them is largely past. In order to truly combat the coming plague, the restrictions will have to be lifted to allow pilots and pest control technicians to work around the clock. Of course, this will not happen until conditions improve or a COVID-19 vaccine or cure is implemented. This is bad news, and not just for East Africa, the Middle East, and East Asia. Locusts are known to fly through whole to reach new sources of vegetation. While colder climates are less likely to be affected, there is no telling how far the swarms of locust will reach before they are contained.
