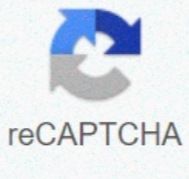




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## Throne of glass book 3 online

In the books, Tyrion does make the trek to Meereen, but he doesn’t get to meet the Mother of Dragons. The show, on the other hand, makes the two close compatriots. Show Tyrion is made to be Daenerys’ trusted adviser and maintains order - if you can call it that - in the kingdom when she’s away. Book Tyrion? He’s never given the option. Arya is a lot of people’s favorite character, in both the books and beyond. In fact, it’s hard for the little warrior not to be liked. If you’re not on her List, that is. Arya’s list in both is essentially a “to-do” list on who she’s going to kill. Notable differences on the show are the addition of Melisandre and Walder Frey, though she’s not sure of her name. In “A Clash of Kings,” on the other hand, the list is her own idea. When it comes to visuals, it’s hard to translate what’s on the page to something onscreen. With reading, everyone can picture their own version of what’s being described; whereas onscreen, creative decisions have to be made. The White Walkers fit into this distinction. He’s still a Snow, not a Stark. And despite being a Stark being his biggest wish growing up, he seems to continually avoid it as best he can. If you ask us, Book Robb knew this would happen, and that’s why he enforced it himself. On the show, most of the cast is at least ten years older than the characters are in the books. Although this tends to be something most of Hollywood does and it makes sense, given the mature themes in the show, stories like Jon’s and Arya’s are even better when you know how old they are in the books. What is pupillary distance? Your pupillary distance (PD) is an essential measurement because the optical center of each eyeglass lens must be positioned directly in front of the center of each pupil. An incorrect PD measurement could cause eye strain, blurred vision or even double vision.At a brick-and-mortar eyeglasses store, your optician will measure your pupillary distance for you. At online glass stores, instructions will walk you through how to calculate your pupillary distance yourself. In some cases, your PD can be measured from a photo. Worried you may have measured your pupillary distance incorrectly? Some online glasses stores have opticians standing by to help.How do those frames fit on your face?How will those snazzy new frames fit your face? Start with the pair you’re currently wearing. In a store, your optician will begin the fitting process by getting the measurements of your current frame.At an online glasses store, videos and guides will walk you through finding the measurements of your current frames. Once you’ve selected your frames, it’s time to pick your lenses.Lenses: What are your options?After your eye exam, your eye doctor probably explained a bit about your prescription. He or she may have discussed your lenses options — such as progressive lenses or bifocals if you are over age 40 and need multifocal lenses.If you are ordering your prescription glasses online, especially if you need only single-vision lenses, the process is pretty simple. But as you look at it, you wonder what it’s telling you. It may be displayed as a grid or a chart or it may just be scribbled in the doctor’s handwriting. Single vision prescriptions — These prescriptions include the abbreviations O.D., O.S., SPH, CYL, AXIS and PD. Carefully transfer the numbers written in those categories to the appropriate places online. Notice that SPH and CYL always have a + or - with them. These are very important to include.Multifocal prescriptions — Prescriptions for bifocals or progressive glasses will have ADD or NV with a plus sign + and possibly D.V. for distance vision/nearsightedness and N.V. for near vision/reading. PRISM prescriptions — This type of prescription will include values for PRISM and BASE, which correct for eye misalignment problems, such as double vision (diplopia).Where to buy prescription glasses onlineThe next step is to research and compare online eyewear retailers to find the perfect pair of glasses for you. Some of the first-time discounts you’ll find are big money savers but not if you’re a returning customer.Choose your framesNow that you have chosen the company you want to buy from, it’s time to select your frames. You’ll find there’s a vast array of frame styles out there, as well as a range of materials, including colorful plastics and lightweight metals. It may be helpful to first determine the shape of your face to find glasses frames that will look best on you. If you’ve never really thought about your face shape before, get started by looking in a mirror. Pull the hair away from your face, including bangs if you have them, so you can see your face’s overall shape, contours, etc. Once you have a sense of your face shape, consider the following guidelines to help you figure out the best frame style for you:Narrow frames can make an oval face appear longer, but otherwise, oval faces can handle just about any style.Square faces have a strong jawline, so look for rounded frames that will soften angles.Rimless and semi-rimless frames will also work well.Angular frames look great on round faces, helping to add definition to features, whereas circular frames can make features look lost on a round face. Heart-shaped faces are wide at the forehead, narrowest at the chin and have high cheekbones. Thin frames that are either round or oval will flatter the angles of heart-shaped faces.Rimless, oval and rectangular frames balance the features of a diamond-shaped face, which is the most rare of all face shapes.Using these tips, choose frames you like. Don’t be afraid to go outside the recommendations to include frames that attract your attention, too, because what matters most is how you feel in your glasses. There’s no harm in trying on wild or funky frames and bright colors if you want to. If you have a budget in mind, don’t choose frames that are more expensive than what your budget allows.Try on your frames virtuallyMost online eyeglasses retailers offer a “try-on” feature — typically, you can either upload a photo of yourself or use one of their models. (If you’re using their models, choose one that most closely matches your face shape, hair length and skin tone.) Since you don’t have the help of an objective staff member with an online purchase, consider asking someone whose opinion you value to watch as you model the different styles. Narrow your choices down to your favorite two and then pick the one that will be the most versatile, no matter what you’re wearing, what you’re doing or where you go.Adding special lens featuresAfter you’ve decided on frames, enter that prescription you have on standby along with your PD (this may be done later in the checkout process with some websites). As for lens types and materials, some things to look for include:Polycarbonate and Trivex - Thinner and lighter than most other plastic lenses. Ideal for children’s glasses.High-index lenses - A lightweight option for people who have a strong prescription but want to avoid thick, heavy glasses.Photochromic - Light-adaptive lenses that automatically darken when exposed to sunlight. Glass lenses, the original lens material, are still available as well, though this option is heavier and more likely to break.From here, you can add lens extras or upgrades, including anti-scratch coating and blue light blocking coating, which can help improve the look and comfort level of your glasses.Read prescription glasses online reviewsThroughout the process of buying prescription glasses online, keep an eye out for reviews of the products and websites you’re considering. Generally, you’ll find positive reviews on the more popular sites because they’ve worked hard to overcome initial service flaws and make the shopping process more user-friendly. But negative reviews are there too, and it’s up to you to decide if these are warranted and mean you should keep away, or if they simply indicate a glitch here or there.
