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A legend on the map shows colors, shapes and symbols to define a certain characteristic of the map. In a physical location map, you may find areas of lakes, river and mountain ranges highlighted in the legend of the map by the type of map that is being used. On a political map, you will find hazards of influence belonging to a Political Party or Individual Politic Party. A legend of the map will show colors and shapes for political influences, such as parties, which are dominant in a particular state or region. Using a map legend The legends of the map are often found at the top or bottom of a map, with a color or symbol and a description of what these colors and symbols mean. For example, looking at a larger map can give travelers an idea of what's in the surrounding area, and not just on the Direct Route to Location. Every day, an average of 23,000 people around the world are forced to flee their homes because of war or the threat of persecution. Many end up crossing international borders and becoming refugees; Millions of people migrate every year on a series of dizzying roads. Now, a new infographic for the Refugee Project for the first time maps every refugee migration since 1975.The project started when designers from the firm Hyerakt discovered a mountain of data during a visit to the U.N. High Commission for Refugees in Geneva. "We were a little blown up by the content they had and they saw that the way they were using it wasn't as convincing as it could be", says Deroy Peraza, director and creative director of Hyperakt. The team team teamed up with Ekene Ijeoma, and âthen poured 500 hours of volunteer work to build the website. On the map The circles around each country expand and contract as the refugee flow grows or slow down, and a heat map at the bottom shows how the volumes have changed over time. The radiant lines show the countries where They have found asylum. The site also goes further than making the data clearer - a switch on the graph shows the number of refugees as a percentage of the population, a comparison that the UN has not done before. "There are small countries that at some point in history had a large part of their population abandoned, but they are often not such a big story because the volume of refugees is not as large as other countries. But for the reality of that country it must have been a tremendous impact", says Peraza. The website also includes headlines of turning points in each country's history, to help contextualize migrations. Peraza says the team wants to keep adding more stories. "We would like to do some stories and testimonies with refugees to add a more human face to this project", she says. "Right now, it really wants to be a kind of atlas".Another facet that the team hopes to add, assuming they find funding to continue working on the project. , is the history of the asylum "not just of the places to which refugees have fled, but of the countries that have taken them in. "We see this as the tip of a data iceberg", Peraza says. "There's so much more we'd like to add."
