In literature, the conflict is every fight that the characters must overcome to achieve their goal. It can be a true WorldÂ € or antagonist obstacle (external conflict) or some inner disturbance that our heroes have to face before getting what they want or need (internal conflict). Â, as we mentioned in the previous paragraph, all good stories are guided by a conflict. With the understanding of what stands between the characters and their goals, we can begin to understand what their stories are around. The seven most common types of conflict in literature are: Â, in this post, we will analyze these types of conflicts and to provide examples of the world of popular narrative. Before entering some of the most abstract types, let's first look at what most readers think when you imagine a conflict €.

1. Character vs. character (s) pesky people: they cause problems wherever they go! That's the crucial point of this type of external conflict, which you'll find many, if not most, stories. 2. Character vs. A particularly widespread society in the narrative these days, this type of external struggle wells of the individual against the collective. In this type of conflict, society will put pressure on our character to change and fall neatly in order. On the other hand, our protagonist will be resisting this change and, in extreme cases, the company will try to bend to satisfy their vision. Like the history of David and Goliath, our hero must face a uphill battle, but the reader speaks hope that the little Guya can overcome an apparently impossible challenge. Examples of social character vs conflict the hate u give: when his friend is killed by a policeman, afro-american teenager Starr seeks justice, but he finds himself against a structural racism system that extends by the police and the media, All the way to his private school and internalized racism. "I fought the law and the law won." (Image: FOX) The devil dresses Prada: Idealistic graduate Andrea to Andy's Sachs moved to New York and soon lands a very popular position as a Junior Assistant Miranda Priestly, the tyrannical editor of a fashion magazine. 3. Character vs Nature How do you want your odds in a fight against Mother Earth? In this type of conflict, which is exactly what our protagonists are facing. Technology € Could evoke the image of a terminator-like Apocalypse robot, this type of conflict could also be modest as someone who fights to teach their grandmother Millie how to use Emojis! 5. Character vs. Supernatural when your hero finds himself against something that cannot be explained with logic or science, I probably conflict with supernatural forces! While some writers use this type of conflict to tell overwhelming stories, supernatural stories can also explore human fears and all unexplained day events. In practice, the font vs supernatural conflicts often see the protagonist face off against the forces of destiny, religion, ghosts, of demons or aliens.
