The spectators, if they stick to the series, can be forced to take a break between the episodes. Occasionally, the episode is so bad that some people can’t even finish watching! In fact, we have whole shows based on questionable content. Some of these shows would not even exist a few decades ago because of the content. It can handle every case and situation properly, but the public thought it was too surprising. Then there are new horror shows. Others remained in traces of laughter and tried to shed light on the situation. In both cases, we know that classical TV was not as sweet and innocent as it retracted. These are 30 of the most spoken moments that have ever happened in classical television.
After Sammy Davis Jr. leaves a briefcase in Archie’s taxi, visit the Bunkerto recover it. While there, he takes a headset of his closed mind, he takes everything. In this episode of Seinfeld, Jerry and his friends are annoyed that they are stuck in traffic due to a parade of Puerto Rican Day. At some point Kramer accidentally sets a Puerto Rican flag on the fire then accumulates on it to put it out. The first time Elvis Presley appeared on The Ed Sullivan Show, the cameramen were careful to show him only from life up. However, hiding his swirling hips made him only more intriguing. Also, the audience at home received the message that her dance was sexy by the screaming women in the live audience. (image via Pinterest)
In the season one of Maude, the titular character is pregnant at the age of 47. This episode in two parts covers its decision whether or not to interrupt pregnancy. Although the resolution was legal in his New York state, the episode aired several months before Roe v. Wade shut down legal pregnancy throughout the country. In this case, the first time TV fed the controversy America was already talking about. (image via Youtube)
Whoever saw Diffrent Strokes would havecalling him a nice family show, but “The man of the bicycle,” was not as familiar as the spectators wanted. In this episode, Arnold and Dudley are drawn to the back of a bike shop where the owner, Mr. Horton, shows the children’s magazines that are best left hidden. It also encourages children to do a photo shoot. What might be more worrying is that Dudley doesn’t seem to recognize what kind of situation he is in. During the entire race to revelation, the jokes are still in the process of realization, which seems simply disturbing. After a deformed child is in a shallow grave, Mulder and Scully launch an investigation that leads them to a frighteningly violent family that is a little too close. This episode was so gross and shocking for spectators that Fox broadcast only once after the first. Ask any X-Files fan of the episode, and they’ll get angry! (image via Youtube)
Mary Tyler Moore shows the boundaries pushed by showing one professional woman who lived alone and supported herself. In this particularly controversial episode, viewers see Mary coming home in the morning in the same clothes she was going out the night before. Although he was never declared to be with a man, the insinuation was still shocking at the moment. (image via Youtube)
In this episode of the classicseries, Al and Peg Bundy go to a motel room to have sex, just to find a sex tape of their neighbors! On top of all this, the Bundys are also secretly tapes. All this was too much for the network, and the episode was banned until 2002, well after Married… with the children had been erased. (image via Facebook)
The word “incinta” was considered too vulgar to say on TV during the 1950s. So this episode turns around Lucy trying to tell her husband that she is “expecting”, all while dancing around the feared “word”. Network managers were so worried about the implication of sex that Lucy and her husband slept in secret twin beds on the show as well! (image via Youtube)
When Ellen came out of the closet on her 90s television show, she faced the backlash of advertisers and religious groups. The episode had high votes, but the show was canceled the following year after being called “too gay”. During the Cold War, Mr. Rogers broadcast a week of shows to help children face the idea of nuclear war. While someone liked the show by facing such an important problem, others thought that thematic matter was too intense for children. In this controversial episode, King Friday thinks Southwood is picking up parts to bomb. However, the parts are actually for a bridge, and two neighborhoods end up having a peace festival. “F**or every man, There are two women**” took a dark turn when Monroe comes homehe dispersed, and it turned out that he was attacked by two women who “had their way with him.” Eventually the police are called, but they tell Monroe that pressre charges would be too embarrassing and it’s not worth it. Irish singer Sinead O’Connor took advantage of live television to protest against the Catholic Church. During clothing testing, he held an image of a child refugee while performing Bob Marley’s song “War”. However, during the actual performance, he held a photo of Pope John Paul II while singing the word “male”. Then he yelled: “Look at the real enemy,” and took the picture. NBC received 4.440 complaints due to the accident. “Bored, She Hung Herself” has covered a subject that is still sensitive today: suicide. The episode concerns a yoga instructor who is testing a new “technical”, which involves asphyxiating to stop his heartbeat. The couple enters a fight, where they slap him, and he slaps her, knocking her to the floor. After he leaves, he is immediately after hanging a loop. The episode only aired once. Everything in the family was clearly a magnet for the polemics during its race. In this episode, while his family is planning his birthday party, Edith is holding a gunpoint and attacked. The show was usually fun, and the audience was shocked that this happened to a sweet and loved character. (image via Youtube)
NYPD causedbefore I have ever transmitted due to the amount of nudity and adult language in it. However, the controversy contributed to generating curious viewers for the show, which stuck around for editing and because it was such a big series in general. (image via wikipedia)
shows for children are usually light heart, but not “one beer” from tiny toon adventures. begins quite innocent, with the characters going over what drinks were in the fridge - until "a cold" is offered. The characters get drunk and drunk in a car accident, and these stunts caused the episode to get immediately banned. (image via youtube)
originally aired in 1964, “The Encounter” presents george takei before being a family name thanks to star trek. the twilight area was always destined to be disturbing and “out of this world”, but “the Encounter” was a little too close to home, like a Japanese-American and a veteran of the Second World War struggle to kill himself in the attic. He portrayed the ptds from the point of view of a soldier, the dehumanization of war, and ethnocentrism towards the Japanese people. cbs pressed the episode after being broadcast on**ce.** (image via wikia)
sometimes manufacturers and creators infuriated fans with their plot lines, and “Return to camelot, part I” is a great example of this. rather than being particularly creepy, this episode turned off fans because it revealed the death of bobby ewing from the previous season to be a dream - meaning the end of season 8 and the entire season 9 was completely denied.via Amazon)
Triste as it seems, an interracial kiss was highly controversial in 1968. In this episode of Star Trek, after responding to a rescue call, the Enterprise crew is overwhelmed by aliens with telekinetic powers. Aliens, known as “Platoniari”, make Captain Kirk (a white man) kiss Lieutenant Uhura (a black woman). Although the episode may not have been received well at the moment, it is now considered an important classic of the series. (image via Instagram)
In December 1976, the Queen was held to attend Bill Grundy’s show Today, but was forced to cancel the last time. In their place, the Sex Pistols took the set and shocked the public with a barracks of profanity. Grundy seemed to provoke his guests, and the Sex Pistols were more than happy to respond. After the air, Grundy was immediately suspended by Thames Television for two weeks due to the “sloppy journalism.” (pictured via Youtube)
It is impossible to imagine how this TV show came to be, but Heil Honey are at home! transmitted in 1990. It was a sitcom that was canceled after a single episode due to obvious reasons: his main character was Hitler. If this was not bad enough, the German dictator and Eva Braun lived next to a Jewish couple in Berlin. While Hitler and Eve were more or less a typical sitcom couple, the network was not having it and pulled it out of the air. Episode as “The Best Man” by Happy Days would be shocking now, but it was especially so in 1974 whenWhile writers and producers tried to deal with racism as a problem, they made jokes about it and included incredibly racist that would leave modern viewers slack-jawed - including, “we have watermelon all the time” and “white hoods make me nervous.” “Miri” is another of the most controversial episodes of Star Trek. In it, the crew finds a planet similar to Earth, where a band of orphan children lives in fear of disfigured adults called “groups”, who kill them and mutilate them regularly. Even according to Star Trek standards, the episode goes beyond controversy, due to its graphical representations of violence and abuse of children. (picture via Wikia)
The actors of this sketch—Tom Hanks, Dana Carvey and Kevin Nealon—said a word “p” another time in this sketch. Thousands of angry letters were sent later. Another fun fact: this sketch was pulled from the training twice before finally on the air. (Image via YouTube)
The comedy of the mother brothers Hour is a show that has been specifically designed to be a satire of current events, similar to many shows today, but “Don’t Stop the Carnival” has taken things too far. The song, sung by Harry Belafonte, was set against the background of the CBS video at the Chicago National Democratic Convention, where violence broke out between demonstrators and police. Turn-On is one of the biggest flops in TV history. After only 11 minutes, the series was canceled. Yes, this isHe got the axe in the middle of his first episode. The premise was that a computer produced the show and showed quick fire jokes and risqué strikes without a laughter track. Viewers did not respond well as many people got sick or scared by the pictures that came on the screen. Family Matters was a great show to sit and watch with children. It’s silly and funny, but “Stevil” has changed this. The episode was a special Halloween edition, but it became horrible as an Urkel looks like the doll came to life and threatened to kill people. The laughter track sounded in everything, but no one laughed when the dolls tried to steal Urkel’s soul and Carl to burn in the fires of hell. Soap had a list of controversial episodes, but Jodie Dallas was the character who caused religious organizations to send 32,000 letters of protest to the network before the series was aired. Why? Jodie Dallas was the first gay character on American television. However, gay rights activists also mounted several large-scale demonstrations against single episodes of the series due to Jodie’s stereotyped representation and Danny’s denial of sexuality. The M*A*S*H final was the most watched television episode in history. However, some fans were shocked that their favorite character, Hawkeye Pierce (played by Alan Alda), had a nervous breakdown and was in a psychiatric hospital. (image via Stereogum)
