While Trudy Thompson was waiting in a van in the driveway, her husband, Mickey Thompson, closed their big house in Bradbury, California, and then left the garage to reach her. Darkness was giving way to dawn; The Thompsons were early, headed to work. A man came out of the shadows and shot Thompson with a powerful gun. Thompson, hit the bust, tripped a few steps and fell into the driveway. He must have guessed what would happen next. "Don't shoot! Don't shoot! Another armed man shot through the windshield of the van. The van is rolled along the driveway, when Trudy fell or was dragged out. His attacker grabbed her, pointed her gun to her chest and shot her repeatedly. The neighbors, hearing gunshots and screams from Thompson, who was still trying to crawl to his wife, and ended it the same way. Later, Los Angeles County coroner's office concluded that Mickey and Trudy Thompson had already died because of "multiple gunshot wounds to the torso" when the two killers climbed by bicycle and ran off through the gates of the Thompson estate. According to the police, nearby Lance Johnson chased and shot his own revolver against the men on the run. Other neighbors reported seeing two black men cycling, which is rare in this exclusive suburb east of downtown Los Angeles. He had a loyal team of employees and associates, who endured its intensity. On top of that, he told an interviewer, "Half the people I hire leave in three days. I have to be a bastard to work for". Despite Goodwin's success in a similar form of racing, friends and observers wondered if these two strong egos would not collide almost immediately. However, on April 1, 1984, Goodwin merged Stadium Motorsports Corporation (SMC) with MTEG in a partnership which sought to share ownership and operating expenses at 70% for Goodwin and 30% for Thompson. In their first partnership decision, Goodwin expressed a reluctance to compete in the MTEG races already scheduled in July 1984 at the Hoosierdome in Indianapolis and the Pontiac Silverdome outside Detroit. Goodwin had predicted that the races would lose money, but Thompson insisted that they continue because of their strategic location close to the headquarters of the auto industry and sponsors. SMC informed Thompson that it needed \$60,000 to pay some prep bills for the Indiana event. Thompson thought Goodwin would post his 70% stake. In Michigan, SMC asked Thompson for more dollars. He paid, reluctantly, he said, and only because he wanted to make sure his regular staff received their salary. Goodwin again refused to pay its share, claiming that it was not required to pay the costs under their contract. After a trial period of 18 months. Thompson replaced Goodwin; Goodwin controsuase Thompson once said to an interviewer who loved to see a bully getting him coming from him. He would have slammed in a struggle in which the probabilities were against him, oblique to danger to himself, and the battle until the last man gone down. In October, after less than seven months of the partnership, an order of the Court dissolved it and restored MTeg Thompson control. July 15: Goodwins yacht sails in a South Carolina marina. On August 12, he left, presumably for the Caribbean, after despising the tourist port of more than 12,000 dollars, police alleges in a divorce complaint, Mike deposits it on a pier in a Guatemalan port. December 1990: Goodwin is arrested for driving drunk in Aspen, Colorado. About this time, Goodwin and his wife divorced in Texas. It's been two more years. Goodwin enters the federal bankruptcy court in Santa Ana, California, to try to clear his bankruptcy case. He does not know that (a) his debt to Thompson had been declared "unloadable", and (b) on May 5, 1993, a large federal jury had returned a secret charge against Mike and Diane Goodwin, charging them with 12 counts of money laundering and two counts of bank fraud. Goodwin is arrested in court by an FBI agent. Diane Goodwin surrenders to federal agents two days later. The trial dragged on for more than two years, with the Goodwins out on bail most of that time. On October 24, 1995, the Goodwins were sentenced to 12 bank fraud counts and a conspiracy count. Finally, more than 10 months later, on August 9, 1996, Mike was sentenced to 30 months in federal prison, Diane at 16 months. It was also fined for \$300,000 (which remains unpaid). No evidence of Thompson's estate provided financial records that helped the feds to do their case. After his conviction, the court witnesses said that Goodwin threatened Collene Campbell's life, who claimed he broke into a bank and stole documents that would exonerate him. "Yes, that threat was corrupted," said Detective Lillienfeld. Goodwin's threats were nothing new. At least 20 people have filed sworn statements with Department investigators Sheriff of the Los Angeles county that Goodwin told them, among other things, that "if Mickey kills me, I'll take it out", before the denial of his appeal to the Supreme Court. A former employee of Goodwin, hired by Thompson, told the investigators of the sheriff: "I received a death death Mike. He called me at 1:00 in the morning and threatened to kill me. It was right after I started working for Mickey when the litigation was becoming serious. He was shocked, he played wild, swearing, biting, calling me names, saying, "I'll kill you. You're a dead man! Come on. Mickey received similar threats from Mike, who told me about." While in federal custody, Goodwin claimed he had suffered a back injury when a guard threw him down a stairwell. He was transferred to a prison clinic in Minnesota. There, in an interview with America's Most Wanted, which aired in December 1997, Goodwin was asked if he was responsible for the Thompson murders. He answered: "What happened, nine years? If you were involved, they'd already have me." Goodwin asked for early release in order to get more medical treatment. Goodwin, now 53 years old, won parole in July 1998. In everything, it served less than two years. He put home on a boat owned by his father in a Ventura, California, navy. (His ex-wife moved to Virginia after his release.) A week later, the Campbells, who the police say they feel their lives are at risk with Goodwin free, published their \$1 million reward. "Where Mickey left his mark, no one could ever fill it." Mickey's son, Danny, also tried to handle it briefly, but MTEG was finally dissolved by the absolute definitive failure of chapter 7 in 1993. Thompson's son, Danny, 49 years old, retired from his career as a racing driver, although he is still urging support of sponsors for a project to build another land speed record driver.
